Eurocities, POLIS, and CLARS applaud EU Parliament's vote but seek inclusion of all vehicle-access restrictions for fairness.

Eurocities, POLIS, and the CLARS platform welcome Wednesday, 23 April's vote of the European Parliament on the **cross-border enforcement directive (CBE Directive)**, which extended the directive to cover violations of rules on **vehicle-access restrictions**.

While disappointed that all vehicle-access restrictions have not been included in the directive, the organisations expect that such an inclusion will drastically reduce the burden put on local enforcement authorities at the time of enforcing vehicle-access regulations. It will also resolve the inequitable circumstances among drivers depending on the location of their vehicle registration.

With already hundreds of vehicle-access regulations put in place in Europe, and many more to come in the next years, ensuring fair treatment between drivers is key to fostering the social acceptance of such measures. Their inclusion in this revision of the cross-border enforcement directive would have preserved the integrity of vehicle access regulations, which are key to decreasing air pollution, and greenhouse gas emissions, as well as improving road safety in cities.







André Sobczak, Eurocities Secretary-General:

'While the final outcome of the discussions is not ideal, we are pleased that EU policymakers have at least put the issue of the enforcement of local traffic rules on foreign vehicles on the table. As we approach an election year, I believe such a practical example can demonstrate why a European approach is necessary to address local issues. Our members will carefully monitor the reviewing of this directive and stand ready to remind the EU institutions about their commitment to continue to address the issue in the coming years.'

'Cities and regions welcome the first steps towards a European solution to fair and efficient enforcement of access regulations. We thank the people in the Parliament, Council, and European Commission who stood with the local mayors, vice-mayors, professional drivers, and citizens on this issue. However, the text does not answer the immediate needs of ambitious cities pursuing clean air and climate neutrality. We need the next European Commission to take this fully at heart. European citizens deserve fairness and efficiency in the way Urban Vehicle Access Regulations (UVARs) are enforced.'
